Terrio has an Associate Degree and has previously worked at a Certified Nursing Assistant for 13 years, and a Massage Therapist for 14 years.

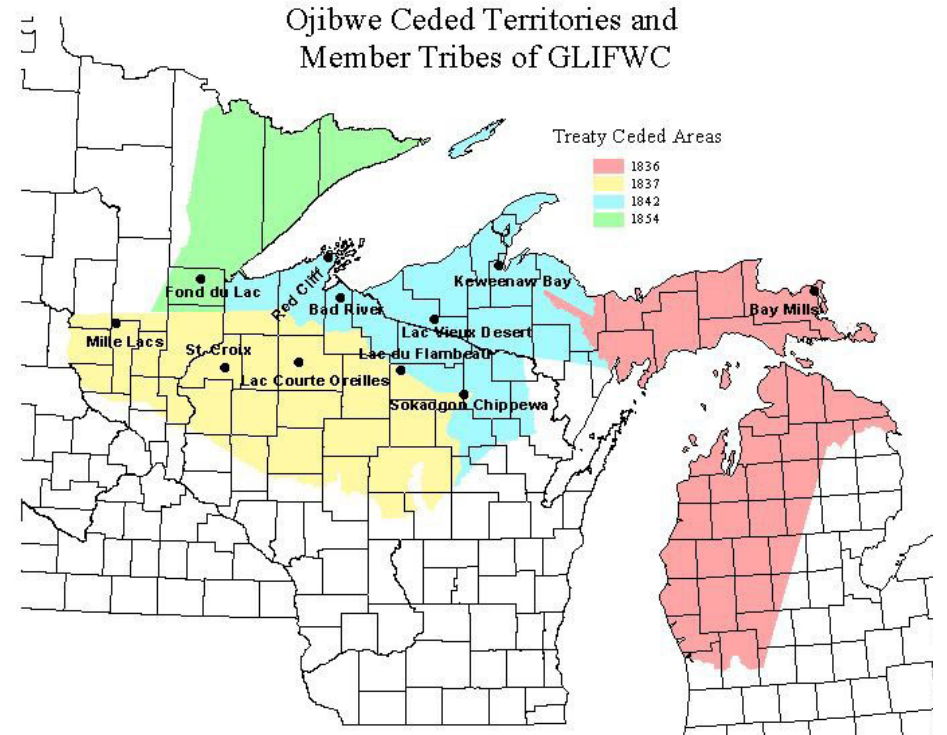
Barbara is married to William "Bill" Terrio and they have two children Tia and Sylas.

Tribe Files Amicus Brief on Pipeline

Beaulieu Lake Access Improvement Project



The SMC Ecology Department recently completed a project at the Tribally-owned 20-acre parcel on Beaulieu Lake. The project had two goals; reduce the amount of erosion entering the lake and improve accessibility. To accomplish these goals, the slope of the approach **Lake cont on page Eight:**

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Oil cont from page One: unacceptable risk of an oil spill into the Great Lakes,” and asks the court to reverse its decision to keep the lawsuit in federal court. Tribes have cultural, economic and treaty-related interests in halting the pipeline. The “dual pipelines” is a four-mile section of two parallel pipelines that run beneath the straits that connect Lake Michigan to Lake Huron. President Holsey said “The Stockbridge Munsee Community recognizes the importance to protect the Great Lakes by signing on to an amicus brief regarding the Line 5 Dual Pipelines. This amicus brief will focus on the Michigan Attorney General’s interlocutory appeal in the Sixth Circuit challenging the federal district court’s denial of the AG’s motion to remand to state court her case that seeks to shut down operation of Enbridge

Energy’s dual pipelines that run through the Straits of Mackinac”. In June 2019, *Nessel v. Enbridge* was filed in state court to stop further operation of the dual pipelines. In a move delaying the lawsuit for three years, Enbridge moved the case to federal court in 2020. The State of Michigan and the tribes who filed the brief believe the lawsuit could be resolved faster if it were returned to state court. Line 5 is outdated and past the projected engineering ‘lifespan’ by 20 years. It was constructed in 1953 without the consent of Tribal nations whose lands and cultural landscapes it impacts. It carries crude oil and natural gas liquids from western Canada-snaking through Wisconsin and Michigan- to Sarnia, Ontario. Along this path the pipeline passes through lakes, watersheds, and natural habitats. It

also cuts through the lands and waters reserved by Ojibwe tribes in the Treaty of 1837: 26.8 million acres (see graphic) in exchange for the rights to hunt, fish, gather and maintain their way of life on these lands.

Each side has time to file a response, and once the briefing is concluded the Court of Appeals will either hold an oral argument or decide the case based on the briefs.

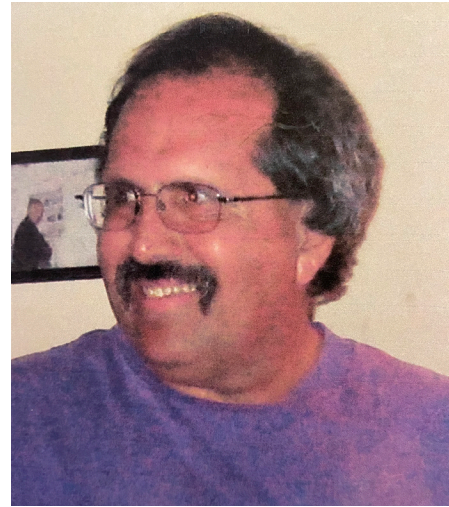

Toxic Exposure Screening

As a Veteran, during your military service, you may have been exposed to environmental hazards, such as Agent Orange. To learn more about your exposures, you can have a toxic exposure screen (TES) during a routine health care appointment, which will allow your exposures to be documented in your record. The TES includes a series of questions that take about 5-10 minutes, and the potential exposures to various hazards are recorded. This screening is not meant for diagnostic purposes but can address concerns about your health and deployment. Following the screen, you will receive information about benefits, environmental health registry exams and clinical resources to address any concerns.

If you have any questions about the TES, you can contact your local VA health care team via Secure Message or call 1-800-MyVA411 and press 8. You can also inquire about the TES during your next VA health care appointment or contact your local VA facility and ask to be screened by the TES Navigator if you want to be screened sooner. It is important to note that you will be screened at least once every five years, even if you do not have any concerns at present. We recommend that you take advantage of this opportunity better understand your health.

Vietnam-era Veterans, the PACT Act, and the Agent Orange Registry

Do you know the difference between the PACT Act and the Agent Orange Registry? The PACT Act, more formally known as the Sergeant First Class Health Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics Act, was

signed into law on August 10, 2022. It expands health care benefits for Veterans. The Agent Orange Registry helps Veterans understand possible long-term health problems that may be related to Agent Orange exposure.

Learn more about the difference between these two initiatives.

The PACT Act

- The PACT Act is a law that empowers VA to provide expanded benefits and care to Veterans who were exposed to environmental hazards during military service.

- It ensures that every Veteran enrolled in VA health care can receive an initial toxic exposure screening at VA and follow-up screening at least every 5 years.

- It solidifies VA's process for establishing presumptions of service connection of toxic exposure-related conditions.

Presumptive Conditions
The PACT Act added to the list of health conditions that we assume (or "presume") are caused by military exposures. If you have a presumptive condition, you don't need to prove that your service caused the condition. You only need to meet the service requirements for the presumption. For Vietnam Veterans, the PACT Act added the following presumptive conditions:

- High blood pressure (also called hypertension)
- Monoclonal gammopathy of undetermined significance (MGUS)

Presumptive Locations

The PACT Act added 5 locations as additional presumptive locations for Agent Orange exposure:

- Any U.S. or Royal Thai military base in Thailand from January 9, 1962, through June 30, 1976
- Laos from December 1, 1965, through Septem-

- Guam or American Samoa or in the territorial waters off Guam or American Samoa from January 9, 1962, through July 31, 1980

- Johnston Atoll or on a ship that called at Johnston Atoll from January 1, 1972, through September 30, 1977

If you served on active duty in any of these locations, VA will automatically presume that you had exposure to Agent Orange.

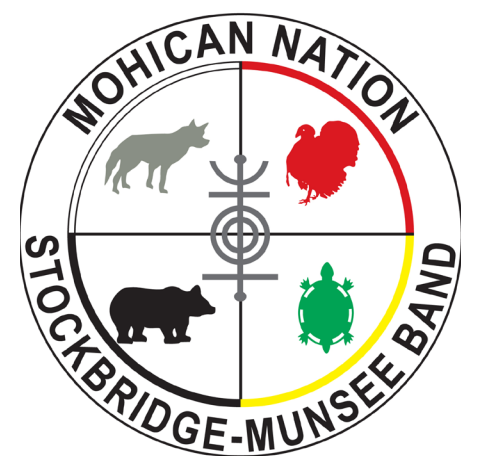
If you served on active duty in any of these locations during these time periods, you are eligible to apply for VA health care:

- The Republic of Vietnam between January 9, 1962, and May 7, 1975
- Thailand at any U.S. or Royal Thai base between January 9, 1962, and June 30, 1976
- Laos between December 1, 1965, and September 30, 1969
- Certain provinces in Cambodia between April 16, 1969, and April 30, 1969
- Guam or American Samoa (or their territorial waters) between January 9, 1962, and July 31, 1980

- Johnston Atoll (or on a ship that called at Johnston Atoll) between January 1, 1972, and September 30, 1977

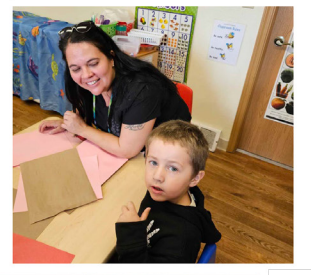
Lake cont from pg One: road had to be reduced, rainwater runoff had to be directed off the road and away from the lake, and steps needed to be made to stabilize the boat ramp. After installing a silt fence along the lake to capture any runoff during construction, the project started by excavating the existing boat launch area down 4 inches. The excavated area was compacted and crowned (sloped away from the center of the road) before an erosion control material called GeoCell was installed. This material is made of high-density poly ethylene (HDPE), consisting of a network of 4-inch deep cells that are filled with road material. Once the cells are filled with the road material, lateral movement of sediment and/or water is nearly eliminated and contained in place. Also, because of the structure of the cells, the finished road can support nearly double the weight of gravel at the same thickness alone. Larger sized rock, called rip-rap, was added to each side of the ramp to help slow down any runoff during heavy rain events. The next step of the project was to shape the parking area and approach road to direct runoff away from the lake. The parking area received a slope through the middle that directs runoff to an area of rip-rap where it is slowed down before entering the adjacent woods. The parking area also received

an extended area to park vehicles and turn around boat/kayak trailers. The approach road down to the lake was excavated and resurfaced with new gravel to have a consistent slope from top to bottom. This involved cutting down the crest of the hill and building up on the downslope side. Again, the road was crowned to divert water to the edges of the road and into the bordering rip-rap where runoff can be slowed before reaching the adjacent woods. A small culvert was also installed to allow water to run underneath the road so heavy rain events don't cause any harmful erosion to the road. Lastly, excess material from re-sloping the road was used to build a berm along the slope between the pavilion and the lake. The berm was seeded in native pollinator mix and will help capture any runoff from the lawn around the pavilion. Native plant plugs will be installed in 2024 to speed up establishment of the pollinator friendly prairie. The project was funded using EPA 319 Nonpoint Source Pollution grant. The SMC Ecology department's Clean Water Program receives annual base funds through this grant to complete projects aimed at reducing pollution reaching Tribal waters. 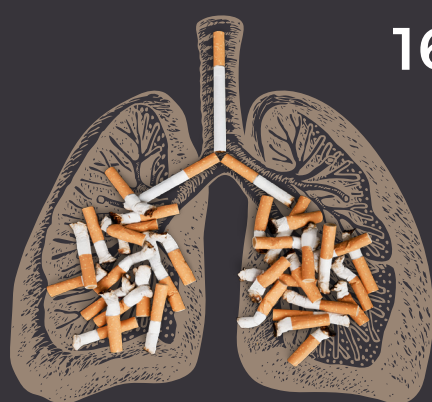
Chapter 56.2 speaks specifically to the point of obtaining Food Service Permits. Food Service Permits are **mandatory** for food service operation.

- Food Service Permits will not be issued unless the vendors comply with all aspects of our food code.
- Our Food Code requires all food handlers to have documentation of a current FOOD HANDLER CARD and food stands must submit to inspection prior to any sales.

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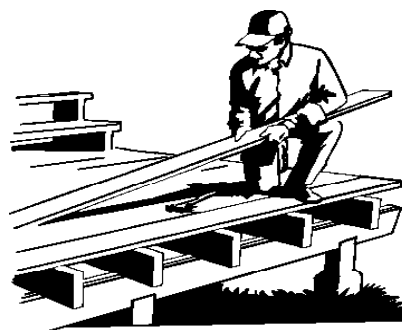
