Planning for the Future

On June 17, 2015 the Tribal Council approved a Strategic Plan with an effective start date of October 1, 2015. The Strategic Plan consisted of 18 Goals; each having objectives to carry out. Goal #8 was New Tribal Facilities Plan, which had one objective to complete a study of space needs. On July 13, 2016 the Tribal Council approved to enter into a contract with Venture Architects, a firm out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin to complete a work-space needs analysis, current facilities assessment and recommend future development to meet the work-space needs of the organization.

Venture Architects completed their study and provided the recommendation to create a campus-style structure for future office space development. This would allow for construction in phases as funding or grant opportunities become available.

The four buildings would consist of:

Administrative – Tribal Offices:
All Tribal Office departments currently housed at the current Tribal, Legal and Administrative Offices would be housed together.

Land & Natural Resources:
The staff/offices of Land Management, Agriculture, Land & Enrollment, Environmental, Forestry, Ecology and Water Resources would be housed in this facility.

Judicial & Public Safety:
Tribal Court, Law Enforcement and Conservation would be housed in this facility.

Cultural Center:
Education, Historical Preservation and room for Cultural Center staff would be housed in this facility.

Historical Seminar Held at the North Star Casino Event Center

The Stockbridge-Munsee Community Historical Seminar took place at the North Star Casino Event Center on June 22, 2018. The seminar consisted of presentations aimed at sharing and revisiting the history of the Stockbridge-Munsee tribe. It opened with the Presentation of the Colors by the Mohican Veterans, an Honor Song by the Puzzle Hill Singers, and an introduction by Councilman Jeremy Mohawk.

The speakers were Rick Wilcox, a former Stockbridge Massachusetts police chief, who is an avid historian of the Mohican people; Anne Morton, an archeologist based out New York that works with the tribe; Mark Wilson, the curator of collections and cultural resources manager for The Trustees of Reservations; JoAnn Schedler, a tribal elder/historian.

Rick Wilcox gave an explanation of some of his historical research on Stockbridge Myths, these are things that he has become more familiar with through experience overtime. Wilcox explained the narrative that was pushed when it comes to these myths and how diligent we must be to fight them.

Ann Morton talks about acting as an archeologist for the tribe. Her speech covered topics with some focus on problems within her field. These included problems when it came to inconsiderate naming of sites, and the commercialization and underhanded tactics within the field. The other major part of Morton's speech was an emphasis on explaining her role when it comes to the responsibilities. This was through talk about Section 106 of the Nation Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). The U.S. Department of the Interior National Park

Stockbridge-Munsee stands with tribe facing land trust loss

Holsey writes letter backing Mashpee Wampanoag

A pending decision from the U.S. Department of the Interior on whether to keep holding land in trust for the Mashpee Wampanoag Indian Tribal Council Inc. in Massachusetts has alarmed Native American communities across the country, including the Stockbridge-Munsee tribe in Bowler.

If land currently governed by the Mashpee is removed from trust — a system where land is held for native tribes who are then given certain benefits as a result — it would be the first removal of land in more than 50 years and would signal a major shift in how native tribes interact with the federal government.

For the Stockbridge-Munsee, who have ancestral roots in Massachusetts, it's not something



to be taken lightly. As a result, the tribe sent a letter to federal officials in June, urging Congress to pass legislation to reaffirm the protected status of the eastern tribe.

"We first heard about the Mashpee case through the National Congress of American Indians," Stockbridge-Munsee President

In addition to the structures and organization of offices Venture Architects worked with Tribal Staff to determine building sites.

Site 1:
Located at the current Tribal Offices site. The new site will encompass 13.6 acres. The estimated costs for site development for this site will be \$155,000.

Site 2:
Located at the current Environmental/Forestry/Ecology Building along County Hwy A. The new site would encompass 9 acres. The estimated costs for site development for this site would be \$158,000.

Site 3:
Located near the current Health & Wellness Center of County Hwy A. The site would encompass 9 acres. The estimated costs for site development would be \$120,000.

Site 4:
Located west of Mohican North Star Casino on the north side of Hwy A. Approximately 60

acres was purchased in 1999, former Gara property. This site would encompass 15 acres. The estimated costs for site development would be \$156,000.

Site development for all sites includes utility hookups, onsite utilities, site lighting, paving and landscaping. All costs are based on 2018 costs.

WHAT IS NEXT:

All enrolled tribal Members 18 years and older will receive a survey post card for you to pick the site you would like to see the future Tribal Offices Campus to be built. The information will be tallied and presented to the Tribal Council.

The survey post cards will be mailed to the designated Tribal Members the week of August 13, 2018.

Remember this is for the purposes of future planning. The designation of a site is the next step needed for the plan.

The cost of the hunter's safety course is \$10.00.

Anyone of any age can take the class. Those that meet the course requirements will receive a safety education completion certificate. However, it should be noted that persons younger than 12 years of age may lose some of the benefits of the certification (small game hunting privilege, authorization to shoot an antler less deer during the first gun deer season after graduation) if they take the class sooner than age 12.



Scholars cont from page One: students who want to be more involved at the national level with NIEA to apply to serve as a Student Board Member. This yearly event is coordinated by Mikaela Crank, the Director of the Scholars Program. Mikaela is a citizen of the Navajo Nation and her specialization is college access, Native outreach, advocacy, and student support. Mikaela worked

with tribal member Brigetta Miller, an Associate Professor of Music at the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music who teaches courses in both Music Education and Ethnic Studies. Professor Miller's research interests include culturally relevant pedagogy, interdisciplinary learning, and indigenous history, culture, and identity.

Shannon Holsey said. "They, like any tribe, are entitled to be federally protected. We all have our own rights to self-determination." Initially awarded more than 300 acres of what is viewed as historical land during the Obama administration, the Mashpee began developing the space — including a housing development — through construction of roads and underground infrastructure and were in discussions with a gambling company in Malaysia about a partnership before local residents (backed by a rival gambling business in Chicago) sued in federal court to stop the measure before President Donald Trump took office, according to a recent report from The Associated Press

As a result, the future of the tribe and their various developments remains uncertain. The AP reported that, if the land trust decision were reversed, the Mashpee would have to pay back taxes, disband their court system and shut down their two-person police department. This is something Mashpee Chairman Cedric Cromwell hopes can be ultimately avoided through increased awareness and aid from other sovereign tribal nations to support legislation pending in the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate which would reaffirm the land status for the group.



"We have no timeline on decisions yet from the federal government," he said. "We're essentially waiting to hear, but when federal sovereign nations speak out this is very influential and important. It is important for Congress to hear these voices and letters (like the one from the Stockbridge-Munsee) really help."

The Stockbridge-Munsee letter is urging Congress to allow the Mashpee to go about their business.

"Congress must exercise its plenary authority to ensure that the Mashpee Tribe and its reservation land is protected," Holsey wrote last month. "The Mashpee Tribe, like all other federally recognized tribes, should be entitled to a federally protected reservation where it can exercise its sovereignty, protect its culture and engage in self-determination."

Lake Winnebago Water Walk

“Wisconsin’s Voice in Indigenous People’s Arts and Culture.”

Water protectors gathered on the eastern shores of Lake Winnebago to begin a walk for the water spirit of Lake Winnebago. Starting in the town of Pipe on June 14th, the sun was honored as the day began. Walkers from as far away as the Twin Cities, Madison, and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan smudged up and exchanged water protocols alongside the locals. The famed Grandmother Josephine, for those who don’t know, has walked the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Seaway several times in the protection of water and was the inspiration for this ceremony of water protection. The duties of carrying the water fall to the women, while duties pertaining to the Eagle Staff fall to the men.

These major highways near the shore present a constant danger in every passing semi and auto, so the walk was set up in a relay style, with the relay points resembling a track team passing the baton. The water must always move forward and the carrier never looks back or reverses direction with the carried water. At the morning protocols, water from rivers and lakes representing the

four directions were combined together to be returned to the lake at the end of the walk.

This walk through much of the former New York Indians’ promised homelands was quite eye opening, as the beautiful vistas and Niagara Escarpment served as a backdrop for our experience. Most people don’t realize the long-standing relationship between the Mohicans and the Dutch. Kaukauna, once known as Statesburg, was the product of the New York Indians. After lands had been cleared and grist mills, schools and farms established, the American government took the land back and moved the Stockbridge-Munsee Mohicans, the Brothertown and the St. Regis Mohawk to the east of Lake Winnebago. The Dutch who had favorable relations with the Mohicans since 1609 occupied the lands with confidence of a peaceful future. The Indian contingent moved east and after a fashion of land clearing, mill and farm building, the land was taken again. Plans to scatter the tribes to Minnesota, Kansas and Oklahoma territory were hatched, but once again the land was snatched back.



The term Indian-giver comes to mind. For some it means the Indians gave and wanted back, but truth be told the Euro-contingent took Indians’ land again and again. By 1830s the government not only took land, but bribed, threatened and stole tribal sovereignty. The only things remaining of land holdings are the names Calumet county, Brothertown, Stockbridge, Pipe, and Malone. That being said, it is these same stewards that gathered to express concern for the health of the water. As we all know, without clean water none of us can survive; we are carried in water in our Mother’s womb and need it until we move on to the next realm. It’s the breast milk of Mother Earth and yet we lack respect for it.

In my lifetime I have seen rivers catch a fire and burn and lakes polluted until dead. Everyday water is treated as endless. Sprinklers left to run all day for vanity of green grass. Fertilizers allowed to runoff into aquifers and bodies of water. We as the

two legged ones are responsible for this kind of behavior. This water protection is an effort to raise awareness to some of these concerns. Wisconsinites live in the freshest water in the world, but it’s not endless.

I greatly admire, appreciate and respect these Water Protectors. If you get a chance to volunteer some time to walk or work behind the scenes on lunch, automobile driving or whatever needs doing, then do it. However you choose to help, it’s a good thing.



3. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be deemed consent to levy of any judgment, lien, or attachment upon any property or interest in property of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community.
4. The limited waiver of sovereign immunity granted and approved through this Resolution does not

waive the sovereign immunity of any official, employee, member or agent of the Tribe.

5. Any dispute resolution action against the Tribe, as consented to through this limited waiver of sovereign immunity, shall be brought in the form and venue identified in the agreement(s). The law to be applied, if no law is otherwise identified, shall be federal law. Seconded by Sterling Schreiber. Motion carried.

You're Invited to "Oneida Cuisine: Past, Present, and Future"

An Event Preview and Interview

This event is close to my heart...and belly. What's better is that all of our loyal readers are invited too.

The Oneida Communication Center and Oneida Integrated Food Systems are hosting the "Oneida Cuisine: Past, Present, and Future" event on August 23rd at 5:00 PM. Diners will gather at the Cultural Heritage Site/Salt Pork Avenue Log Homes and will learn about Oneida culture through food and story while enjoying a lovely meal.

I had the good fortune of interviewing Chef Arlie Doxtator about the event. He's an Oneida family man who lives on the Wisconsin lands of his people. Here's a taste of what we discussed.

LPM- When did you know the culinary arts were for you?

AD- I have always been cooking. I knew at a young age in the kitchen with Mom learning flavors, skills and techniques. I was watching cooking shows long before Ramsay or Iron Chef type of shows became popular.

LPM- Did you start in the trenches or was culinary school your route?

AD- Both. I started working in the trade early, then attended Fox Valley Technical College's Culinary Arts program.

LPM- What's this upcoming show about?

AD- This is an exhibition of food in an evolution of time sequences. This meal will be what I call a "Three Generation Dinner"—four courses reflecting foods from Oneida's Pre-contact diet, then the 1830s around the arrival in the Green Bay area, the 1950s, and then the modern era.

LPM- What are the goals of this outing?

AD- To introduce Indigenous flavors into the greater Green Bay community. I'm not a labels guy, but there have always been labels between G.B. and Oneida. Food can be a bridge between cultures; something people can all relate to is a good meal. By a good meal I'm talking fine dining. I was lucky to start on the high end dining in 1988. I started at Wellington's in Green Bay about three years after the Knowles family started the place. Most people get started at mid-level and work for a chance

to get to high-end dining. I was at the right place at the right time—the Wellington was out to maintain a higher standard of dining. At the time, fine dining meant you dressed up and went to a supper club; they made a concerted choice to embark on a fine dining era right away...now everyone is doing it.

LPM- Has the traditional Indian thinking always been a part of your menu?

AD- No, it didn't start until thirteen years ago. Out in Arizona 10 of us like-minded chefs formed the Native American Culinary Association. N.A.C.A. was all about what's now common buzz words such as "farm-to-table" and "food sovereignty." People like Louise Ellis Frank, Franko Lee, Carlos Bacca and a young Brian Yazee along with others decided to cook with "indigenous style." The decolonization moment or should I say movement, started from a hard look at trying to find a healthy diet in Indian Country.

LPM- Did you see yourself as an educator before this event?

AD- Executive Chef should be teacher, mentor and headman in that order.

LPM- What's your favorite comfort food?

AD- Corn soup, our own food, love it.

LPM- What does the future hold?

AD- I have been chosen to attend and food prep 1800s style cooking for the reading of "The Great Law" out east. That's quite an honor. In September, we will be at the farmers' market in G.B. making and tasting food made right off the tables.

LPM- Anything you'd like to add about the "Oneida Cuisine: Past, Present, and Future" event?

AD- We will be serving the meal at the Cultural Heritage Site, where some old homestead cabins stand near the grounds where lacrosse and theatre events are staged. Weather permitting, we will serve about 40 people outdoors, meaning there's a limited number of tickets. Be sure and chase some down.

This bargain event will only cost you \$30 a ticket, with a 50% discount for members of any tribe. You can buy your tickets on the Oneida Community Education Center website.

Colorectal Cancer

The United States Preventative Services Task Force (USPSTF) strongly recommends that clinicians screen men and women at age 50 and older for colorectal cancer. The optimal interval for screening depends on the test. Annual fecal occult blood testing (FOBT)/ Fecal Immunoassay Test (FIT) offers greater reductions in mortality rates than biennial screening. A 10-year interval has been recommended for colonoscopy, but 5-year interval is recommended for flexible sigmoidoscopies because of their lower sensitivity. Fecal DNA Screening (Cologuard test) has been added as a new option for screening in 2015 (recommended

interval every three year). The USPSTF concluded that the benefits from screening for colorectal cancer substantially outweigh potential harms, and that regardless of screening strategy chosen, it is likely to be cost-effective. In persons identified as being at high-risk by their health care providers, initiating screening at an earlier age is reasonable. It is recommended that all adults speak with their health care providers to determine, on an individual basis, the age at which to begin and end screenings, the best type of screening for individual circumstance, and frequency of these screenings.
