Primary Election Added to Stockbridge-Munsee General Elections

On March 06, 2018 Tribal Council moved to adopt a resolution amending the election ordinance to include a primary election. As noted below, the amendment was undertaken following the 2017 election Advisory Primary Referendum Results of 256 yes votes and 149 no votes.

Listed below is the actual letter that went out to all eligible Stockbridge-Munsee voters:

2018 Stockbridge-Munsee Election Board Announcement

To all Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal

Voters,
 The announcement was made July 10, 2018 by the Bureau of Indian Affairs that the request by the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council to add a primary election to the 2018 election process was approved. To make reading and understanding this easier we have *italicized* all actions undertaken by the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council.

The important dates to remember regarding these changes are that a Tribal Caucus will be held on August 18, 2018, a Primary Election will be held on September 15, 2018, and the regular election will be held on October 13, 2018. All of these events will take place at the Tribal Office.

TRADITIONAL MENOMINEE PAGEANT "WAUPAU" TO BE STAGED AUGUST 1

KESHENA, WI, July 10, 2018—The College of the Menominee Nation's theater department invites the public to witness a traditional Menominee Pageant in the Woodland Bowl at sunset on Wednesday, August 1. CMN faculty member Ryan Winn directs for the third consecutive year, with Melinda Cook also returning as stage manager.

This 2018 production will be "Waupau," which was originally produce by James Frechette in 1959 with James Frechette, Jr., serving as director. Set in the 1700s, the script depicts interactions between the Menominee and French and British settlers. The 1959 audience included tourists attending the Keshena Fair, and the pageant's message implored spectators to consider the perspective of the Menominee People.

Courtesy of the Wisconsin Historical Society, the pageant program will include images and the provenance for the medal the British presented to Menominee Chief Tomow in 1778, an act that is depicted within the show.

Menominee Pageants are a mixture of pantomiming, live music, and dancing. This means that the show's oration will be recorded, enhanced with sound effects, and then performed with

the actors speaking their lines along with the recorded track. The pageants also served as an exhibition of dances. As was the case in the past, all dancers are welcome to join the production, but should check-in with the lead dancer, Jamie Awonohopay, prior to the show.

The production is made possible through a grant from the Wisconsin Art's Board and donations from CMN, the Menominee Powwow Committee, and other area businesses and individuals.

The pageant will begin at dusk in the Woodland Bowl, which is located on Fairgrounds Road in Keshena. The show runs around two hours, with an intermission where food and beverages will be sold by local vendors. The pageant is perfect for all ages. Admission is free, but any donations received will be used to fund next summer's production.

Watch for updates: Community Safe Room

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) gave a grant to the Stockbridge-Munsee Community to fund the construction of a community safe room and for the purchase of emergency generators. This grant came from Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) funds.

A community safe room, also known as a tornado/hurricane safe room, is a room built and tested to withstand extreme wind event and

debris. Community safe rooms are also constructed to provide shelter for a much larger group than a residential safe room.

According to Project Manager, Stacey Schreiber, the community safe room will have space for 211 people. It will possess chemical toilets and hold seating for 80 people.

Tribal Council awarded the bid to Crest Precast Inc. Construction started July 9, 2018 and the work is contracted to be completed by September 10, 2018.

Tips for Traveling with Diabetes

Don't let good diabetes management go on vacation just because you did.

Traveling to new places gets you out of your routine—that's a big part of the fun. But delayed meals, unfamiliar food, being more active than usual, and different time zones can all disrupt diabetes management. Plan ahead so you can count on more fun and less worry on the way and when you get to your destination.

Before You Go

1. Visit your doctor for a checkup to ensure you're fit for the trip. Make sure to ask your doctor / Diabetes Educator:

- How your planned activities could affect your diabetes and what to do about it.
- How to adjust your insulin doses if you're traveling to a different time zone.
- To provide prescriptions for your medicines in case you lose them or run out.
- If you'll need any vaccines.
- To write a letter stating that you have diabetes and why you need your medical supplies.

2. Just in case, locate pharmacies and clinics close to where you're staying.

3. Get a medical ID bracelet that states you have diabetes and any other health conditions.

4. Get travel insurance in case you miss your flight or need medical care.

5. Order a special meal for the flight that fits with your meal plan or pack your own.

6. Packing:

- Put your diabetes supplies in a carry-on bag (insulin could get too cold in your checked luggage). Think about bringing a smaller bag to have at your seat for insulin, glucose tablets, and snacks.
- Pack twice as much medicine

as you think you'll need. Carry medicines in the pharmacy bottles they came in or ask your pharmacist to print out extra labels you can attach to plastic bags.

- Be sure to pack healthy snacks, like fruit, raw veggies, and nuts.
- 7. Airport security:
 - Get an optional TSA notification card to help the screening process go more quickly and smoothly.
 - Good news: people with diabetes are exempt from the 3.4 oz. liquid rule for medicines, fast-acting carbs like juice, and gel packs to keep insulin cool.
 - A continuous glucose monitor or insulin pump could be damaged going through the X-ray machine. You don't have to disconnect from either; ask for a hand inspection instead.

Don't leave home without them:

- Doctor's letter and prescriptions
- Snacks and glucose tablets
- Extra insulin and diabetes medicines

While You're Traveling

9. If you're driving, pack a cooler with healthy foods and plenty of water to drink.

10. Don't store insulin or diabetes medicine in direct sunlight or in a hot car; keep them in the cooler too. Don't put insulin directly on ice or a gel pack.

11. Heat can also damage your blood sugar monitor, insulin pump, and other diabetes equipment. Don't leave them in a hot car, by a pool, in direct sunlight, or on the beach. The same goes for supplies such as test strips.

12. You can find healthy food options at the airport or a roadside restaurant:

- Fruit, nuts, sandwiches, yogurt
- Salads with chicken or fish (skip the dried fruit and croutons)

13. Stop and get out of the car or walk up and down the aisle of the plane or train every hour or two to prevent blood clots (people with diabetes are at higher risk).
14. Set an alarm on your phone for taking medicine if you're traveling across time zones.

Once You're There

15. Your blood sugar may be out of your target range at first, but your body should adjust in a few days. Check your blood sugar often and treat highs or lows as instructed by your doctor or diabetes educator.

16. If you're going to be more active than usual, check your blood sugar before and after and make adjustments to food, activity, and insulin as needed.

17. Food is a huge highlight (and temptation!) on a cruise. Avoid the giant buffet, and instead order off the spa menu (healthier choices) or low-carb menu (most ships have one) or order something tasty that fits in your meal plan from the 24-hour

18. Don't overdo physical activity during the heat of the day. Avoid getting a sunburn and don't go barefoot, not even on the beach.

19. High temperatures can change how your body uses insulin. You may need to test your blood sugar more often and adjust your insulin dose and what you eat and drink.

20. You may not be able to find everything you need to manage your diabetes away from home, especially in another country. Learn some useful phrases, such as "I have diabetes" and "where is the nearest pharmacy?"

21. If your vacation is in the great outdoors, bring wet wipes so you can clean your hands before you check your blood sugar.

The following information was taken from the Tribal Directives: On Tuesday, March 6, 2018, the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council held a Regular Tribal Council Meeting and at that time the following actions were taken on the motions:

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON CHAPTER 49-Bridget Swanke, Legal

Motion by Jolene Bowman to adopt resolution 028-18, now therefore be it resolved, the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council hereby adopts the amendments to Chapter 49, which make the following changes: Amended sections: Introduction, 49.1(A), (D), (E); 49.2; 49.3; 49.5; 49.6(A), (B), (C), (D), (E)(3); 49.7; 49.8(A); 49.9(A), (D); 49.11(A); 49.11.5(B); 49.11.7(A), (C); 49.12(A)(3), (B), (B)(1), (B)(1)(a-b), 49.12(B)(2)(c-d), (B)(3); 49.12.5 (B), (C), (D), (E), (F); 49.16(A), (B), and (C). Added new sections: 49.1(A)(3-4); 49.6(B)(1-2); 49.6(D); 49.6(E) (1),(2), (3)(i-ii) and (4); 49.6.5; 49.8(R)(3)(a-b); 49.8(U); 49.8.5; 49.11(A)(1-2); 49.12(B)(2), (4), (5); 49.12.5(A), (E)(1-2), (F)(1-5), (G), (H); 49.12.5(G); 49.16(D); and 49.19. Reordered sections: 49.12 (A) and (B). Deleted section: 49.12(A)(7).

Seconded by Terrie K. Terrio. Motion carried. (Advisory Primary Referendum Results 256 yes votes and 149 no votes)

Listed below are the some of the actual changes to Chapter 49 that will impact the 2018 election:

Section 49.3 Tribal Caucus

On the third Saturday of August at 2:00 P.M., a caucus shall be held at one of the recognized and established meeting places for the community. A notice of the caucus shall be posted by the council secretary at least ten (10) days prior to the caucus. Copies of the notice shall be posted prominently within the community and the council secretary shall otherwise provide for its publication on the tribal website, in the tribal newspaper, and other newspapers as may be necessary.

Section 49.3 Tribal Caucus mandates that a caucus will be held on August 18, 2018 at the Tribal Office.

Section 49.6.5 Primary Election

(A) The purpose of a primary election is to reduce the number of candidates running for each office.

(B) When required, the primary election will be held on the third (3rd) Saturday in September at the headquarters of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community. The voting shall take place between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M., and

voting shall be by secret ballot in booths provided for that purpose.

(C) After conducting the primary election and tallying the vote, the Election Board will certify the eligible candidates for the general election. The Election Board shall prepare the certified candidate list, which lists the candidates alphabetically by office, and deliver such list to the Tribal Council secretary.

- (1) The two (2) candidates with the most votes for each individual office (President, Vice-President and Treasurer) in the primary shall be candidates on the ballot in the general election.
- (2) The eight (8) candidates with the most votes for a Council member seat in the primary shall be candidates on the ballot in the general election.
- (3) In the event the primary election results in a tie for a spot on the ballot for a general election, the tied candidates will be included on the general election ballot even when it results in more than 2 candidates running for individual office or 8 candidates for the office of Council member. For example, in a race for an individual office, if candidate X has 125 votes, candidates Y and Z both have 100 votes, and candidate W has 50 votes, then there will be 3 candidates (X, Y and Z) on the general election ballot for that individual office.

Section 49.6.5 Primary Election mandates that a primary election will be held on September 15, 2018 at the Tribal Office.

Section 49.7 General Election

The annual general election shall take place on the second Saturday of October and shall be held at the headquarters of the StockbridgeMunsee Community. The voting shall take place between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M., and voting shall be by secret ballot in booths provided for that purpose.

Section 49.7 General Election mandates that the general election will be held on October 13, 2018. Again, the important dates to remember regarding these changes are that a Tribal Caucus will be held on August 18, 2018, a Primary Election will be held on September 15, 2018, and the regular election will be held on October 13, 2018. All of these events will take place at the Tribal Office.
